

On a sunny Friday afternoon, a group of about 15 House of Hope 316 senior homeless clients and a handful of agency friends gathered in the Mountain Valley Church of God sanctuary in Prescott Valley for a special, half-hour concert by modern country artist Steven Cade as part of his "Giving Guitars" tour.

The Nashville, Tennessee singer, accompanied by his family, wife, Kellee, his manager, and children Levi and Eliana, and tour sponsor/entrepreneur Brent Yates of the Restore Us Foundation, shared three original songs written with friends that evoke hope amid the strife of homelessness, anxiety and despair. This was the 29th homeless shelter program out of 100 he has planned to visit as part of his tour.

Cade and his family understand a bit of the plight after experiencing a brief stint of homelessness four years ago.

In his recently released song, "Better Me," the second in his repertoire on Friday afternoon, Cade sings of handing a dollar bill to a man with a "homeless" sign that "could have been mine."

In the first song he performed, "You Ain't Over Yet," Cade signs of unseen blessings that rise from the obstacles and challenges of life. He then finished his prepared program with a song he has yet to record, titled, "Big Picture Thinker." Then he added a treat for the audience — a song inspired by his daughter that earned him a Grammy nomination titled "Pinky Promise."

Asked about arranging this tour amid a busy songwriting and concert schedule, Cade said he is a Christian inspired by his faith to give back to others.

He said he wants to use his talents to God's glory and be an entertainer who leads by example. On his visit in this area, Cade performed last week for the Agape House transitional housing program for homeless families in Prescott.

House of Hope 316 Founder and Director Bert Hunt said the recipients of the guitars will be client/house manager Sheree Garrison and Bruce Arehart.
